Overview

Housing is a fundamental necessity. I have worked directly with people experiencing homelessness and have seen how access to affordable housing can change lives. Our work creates housing opportunities for people who may not otherwise have it and I find it very inspiring and meaningful to be a part of that mission.

Kimberly Curtis represents developers in both new construction and acquisition and rehab Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) transactions with complex financing structures. Many of Kim's transactions involve U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) programs including vouchers and Section 202 capital advances.
